Born near Carmarthen; it was, however, from Manchester that he came to Holywell (c. 1818) where he became an excellent singer and acted for many years as precentor of the Wesleyan chapel. In 1844 he produced *Eos Cymru*, a collection of hymn-tunes, chants, and anthems. The collection includes four hymn-tunes and a short anthem of his own composition, and some of Handel's choruses. Newton's tune 'Huddersfield' first appeared in Wales in *Eos Cymru*. He died 27 October 1845 at the age of 68, and was buried in Holywell churchyard.
