These include those to Sir John Lloyd of Yale (*NLW MS 3057D*, 962) and **Thomas Prys** of Plas Iolyn (B.M. Add. MS. 14896, 58); and also one which reveals the poet's acquaintance with contemporary life in London [Jesus Coll. MS. 18 (8)].
