

## MAELGWN ab OWAIN GWYNEDD (died after 1173), prince of Anglesey

Son of **Owain Gwynedd** by Gwladus, daughter of Llywarch ap Trahaearn, uterine brother of **Iorwerth Drwyndwn**, and uncle of **Llywelyn ap Iorwerth**. In the partition of his father's dominions he received Anglesey, but was driven out of the island in 1173 by his half-brother, **Dafydd**. He fled to Ireland, returned later in the year, and was made a prisoner. His subsequent fate is unknown.
